President's May Ponderings

Congratulations to all for a wonderful Plant Sale! We had an impressive variety of plants, and we sold almost everything we had. We raised over \$8,000 for our various community projects! Thank you to everyone for contributing to the effort, but we are especially indebted to Marijke Vallaeys and Carole Herbin for chairing this year. Special thanks go to Patrick Vallaeys who did many jobs, and to our financial team (Meg Bagdonas, Margaret Murphy, and Claudia Wesley) who stepped in for our treasurer who was out sick. Everything went remarkably smoothly, even though Mother Nature decided the plants and people all needed extra watering.

The Garden Club is starting to wind down from our very busy spring season, but we still have two wonderful events ahead: Bromfield graduation, for which we make a number of large flower arrangements to celebrate the day, and our Annual Meeting Luncheon and Garden Tour.

I have seen impressive and widespread talent in our club for flower arranging, so I encourage those of you who have not yet participated in graduation flowers to at least stop by the library lawn during the hours prior to the graduation ceremony and see what fun it is. Or jump in and sign up to help! (there's a Signup Genius for that) It's amazing what can be created with the masses of peonies, rhododendron, iris, deutzia, dogwood, Solomon's seal, and more that you share from your gardens.

We are adding to our schedule of providing flowers at the town library this year to allow impromptu arrangements with flowers you pick from your garden or from local farms. So anytime you are inspired to make an arrangement – which might be a simple vase of flowers-- sign up on the library flowers Signup Genius. This doesn't need to be ahead of time. The signup just lets others know there is currently an arrangement there. (but if we have more than one, that's fine, too. There are several places in the library we can brighten up with flowers!)

Another chance to 'play' with flowers: In addition to library flowers this coming year, we have the opportunity to make an arrangement for the opening reception for each of the exhibits at Fivesparks. You will see the dates on the same Signup Genius as the library flowers. (This arrangement only has to last for a day, so you can experiment more than usual!)

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I hope everyone who can will come to our Annual Meeting Lunch and enjoy the gardens on our Annual Tour on June 10. The day will start with the lunch at the Senior Center, followed by the garden tour. You must sign up ASAP (there's another Signup Genius for that!) so the caterer will have enough food! Don't forget to send your \$25 check for the lunch to Maria Day.

By the way, in case you have trouble keeping track of the various Signup Genii: if you create a (free) account with Signup Genius, all the signups you have been invited to will show up when you sign in... which makes it much easier.

Many of us have trouble remembering names and putting them to faces, so the Board has talked for a while about putting photos into our yearbook directory. We are excited to finally be doing this for the 2024-25 yearbook. Please rest assured that for privacy and security reasons, photos will not be going up anywhere on the website, even in the members only section. They will be included in the pdf of the yearbook we send out to all members; they may be included in the print version of the yearbook, depending on the cost. Patrick Vallaeys has offered to take photos of everyone at our Annual Lunch so we will have quality photos in front of a simple background. I hope you will all be willing to let him take your photo!

We will collect bags of groceries for Loaves and Fishes at the Annual Meeting as we do at our monthly meetings, either in your 'green bag' or any grocery bag. I am hoping we will be able to collect fresh produce to donate during the summer from anyone who has extra from their garden. More on that later.

During the summer we hope to have a couple of times when whoever is available and interested can get together. A trip to Gaining Ground is in the works, and maybe we'll visit a garden or special nursery later in the summer.

I will be inviting you all to an informal gathering in my own garden sometime in August. You'll be able to see and hear about how I have been dealing with the garden challenges of the year. (Right now, I have some critter who has taken a particular liking to the taste of trillium stems and decimated several clumps!!) I trust there will be some successes to balance the tribulations. Maybe it will be my tomatoes on their new red mulch!

It is hard to believe almost two years have gone by since I stepped up to be the President of this wonderful group of gardeners, flower arrangers, and general plant lovers. Thank you all so very much for your support and encouragement! Wishing you much joy in your gardens this summer,

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The Garden Tours - June 10, 2024

This year we will visit the gardens of Simon and Richard; Katy and Spencer, Betsy and Terry, You are welcome to start your garden tour after the annual meeting and lunch.

Simon and Richard's Garden: 45 Westcott Road (617-771-0433)



Simon and Richard have been gardening at 46 Westcott Road since the spring of 2008. Many of the garden borders existed, but they made the beds larger and also created new borders. The perennial gardens include the "Barn Garden", "Office Garden", "Shade Garden", "Bog Garden", "Rock Garden" and "House Garden". There is also a "Shrub/Tree Border". The property includes Blueberry and Raspberry patches, raised vegetable beds and cut flower beds. They have tried to use plants and flowers that attract, bees, butterflies and birds to the gardens.

Katy and Spencer's Garden: 83 Bolton Road (617-640-4809)

The gardens and greenhouse at 83 Bolton Road have been lovingly created over the past decade, with the most recent addition being a redwood greenhouse built during the height of the pandemic in July 2020. This greenhouse has become Katy's happy place, where she nurtures the majority of her plants from seedlings each spring, later moving them to the garden beds when they are ready.



Betsy and Terry's Garden: 87 Bolton Road (978-456-0121)

Moving from Annapolis, MD to Harvard brought challenges, with so many of the plants here which were new to Betsy. The garden flourishes with yellow evening primroses, spring celandines; mountain laurels, plentiful andromedas and lilacs

They installed their first of 5 rain barrels and 3 compost piles. They don't have much sun, but cutting down mature trees didn't seem like a good idea. Developing a shade garden has become a fun endeavor. It's coming along slowly which is just fine.

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Graduation Flowers

You gotta see this (Graduation Flowers transformation) if you never have! Come get involved or see what the process looks like. (Hint: it's arranging in action and never the same from year to year)

Graduation will be outdoors Friday afternoon, June 7th, 5:30 pm on the field between Bromfield School and the new library (if rain, postponed or held Cronin/Bromfield time TBD).

Flowers brought to field: Friday June 7, 9-11:30 am.

Friday morning 10 am at the soccer/hockey field between Bromfield and the new library there will be buckets and buckets of freshly picked and conditioned flowers, shrubs, branches, grasses, all collected and waiting to be considered for arrangements: hosta, phlox, peonies, ladies' mantle, kousa dogwood, mock orange, deutzia, rhodos, lupine, leucothoe, Solomon's seal, mountain laurel, iris, or whatever our member gardeners have available.

Arrangements made: Friday 12-2 pm.

From 5 to 7 arrangements emerge from the many buckets: in huge vases on either side and in front of the graduation stage; in long low window boxes for the entrance where graduates walk in; special arrangements for the diploma table and, sometimes, you'll find them on other places where inspiration and extra flowers have met.

We have some experienced arrangers who have been doing this for years; we have new volunteers with different and exciting ideas. If you have flowers, branches, grasses to contribute, you can let me know by:



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Horticultural Musings

This month I've decided to write about some of the things I do that actually work. Many of you already know these helpful hints.

- 1. If you put a penny in a vase before you put in tulips, the tulips won't droop, but stay upright.
- 2. To get the full aroma of the flowers of witch hazel, blow on the blossoms from the mouth and then sniff the bloom. Try before and after smell.
- 3. When bringing home new flower purchases put in a container of hot water with 1-2T of Clorox and 2T sugar/ pint/quart of water. Then leave overnight. Arrange in your container that has warm water with Clorox and sugar. For peonies 2T sugar + 2T vinegar per pint of water.
- 4. To revive flowers on woody stems, like roses, place in boiling water and leave for a day.

Surely others have tips they find effective.
